
Downing Lecture

Grann's latest book, Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI, is a true crime tale that unravels one of the most sinister crimes and racial injustices in American history. With more than 30 weeks on The New York Times nonfiction bestseller list, it was a finalist for the National Book Award and ranked #1 on Amazon's Single



Best Books of the Year. Killers of the Flower Moon is now in production with Martin Scorcese as director and starring Leonardo DiCaprio.

His first book, *The Lost City of Z: A Tale of Deadly* Obsession in the Amazon, became a #1 NYT bestseller and has been translated into more than 25 languages. The book interweaves the story of the legendary British explorer Percy Fawcett's 1925 quest to find a fabled civilization and Grann's attempt to follow Fawcett's trail and solve "one of the greatest mysteries of the twentieth century." The 2017 film adaptation was called "a mysterious, enthralling masterpiece" by The Atlantic and helped return the book to the *Times* bestseller list eight years after its original release.
